Professor Rupamanjari Ghosh shared the Vice-Chancellor's Report 2020-21.



Grand performances by Snuphoria, followed by a beautiful show by Inferno.snu, the night was concluded by a classic DJ night.








# Celebrating years of Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR

## Devashish Sharma MFA'16 Freelancing Artist

How has the MFA from Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR influenced your journey as an artist, and what about the art pedagogical model at the university distinguishes it from other courses.

During my study of Visual Arts at Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR. interactions with the faculty helped me in many ways. I was influenced most by my independent study sessions with Professor Sharmila Samant. She encouraged and supported me to work outside of my comfort levelsconstantly challenging my attitude towards art-making. These and conversations with her helped me situate myself in a larger social context. The course Aesthetics and Politics with Professor Tushar Joag made me think of my practice within new political parameters. I remember having a very interesting conversation with Professor Sumantra Sengupta- during winter, I happened to meet him in the Dining Hall during breakfast. We spoke about financial sustainability in art practice. And this was very crucial for me at that point, because I had started to experiment with land art and social practice,

I think what distinguishes the MFA at the Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR, is the practice-led research approach that the professors have within their own art practices, and which they, in turn, encourage in the students. Also, having visiting faculty from diverse fields enriches the program immensely.

# Please elaborate on your journey and the highlights of working in your field.

Since 2017 I have been working as a freelance artist, and have been taking forward the questions that emerged while I was studying at the Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR.

In 2018 I received the Public Art Grant from the Foundation of Indian Contemporary Art, and this allowed me to initiate the Museum of Questions at the Saathi School and the Imlee Mahuaa School in the villages of Kumharpara and Balengapara.

The project centres around the idea of using the museum to generate dialogues about the changes being witnessed by the children in their local culture.

A few months before the pandemic, I began working on Road Number Zero, a project based on the Delhi-Gurgaon border. Through this project, I looked at the transition of rural areas into peri-urban and urban areas and the shift in cultural values.

Recently, once the lockdown was firmly in place, I joined the 'What Could Should Curating Do' (WCSCD), a curatorial programme started by Biljana Ciric, a curator from Serbia. The history of art from the countries that were formed after the splitting of Yugoslavia hasn't received the attention it deserves, and this programme intends to produce an archive that formalises the art history of this region.



What motivated you to work in the sphere that you are currently working in? And how has it impacted you as a person, on a personal and professional level?

Most of my projects are community-based, and this has been very fulfilling because I am able to work with people, and also learn from them. Doing such projects has made me see the potential within rural communities, and a need for change in the way urban settlements are structured.

# If you were to advise your juniors, what would you like to tell them?

I made some great friends while studying at Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR, and also learnt a lot from people who were not in my department. So I would urge students to make use of this amazing opportunity to interact with people from diverse fields and expand their thinking beyond a specific discipline.

Besides, I think the MFA at the Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR allows students to explore their work without trying to put them into categories; there is an openness to exploring various forms of visual production.

Did the pandemic have any impact on your life goals? Have you changed the way you handle your work life? Have you observed any positive changes? Are there any happy experiences you would like to share with us?

I live near a forest some distance from Bangalore, so the pandemic perhaps hasn't affected me the way it affected people in the city; the effect has been more psychological than physical. Some of my projects involve travelling to different locations to stay for a few weeks or months. So, I haven't been able to travel, and these projects had to be postponed or have happened online.

An upside of the pandemic has been that several institutions have started hosting lectures online, which till recently were only open to people who were physically present. This has allowed me to be a part of more programmes and access more lectures.

#### If there's is one thing you could have done differently in your time at Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR, what would it be?

While I learnt a lot from my friends from other departments through informal interactions, in retrospect I think I would have liked to attend courses from the physics and biology departments and pursue my interests in those fields as well.

#### One resource or advantage at Shiv Nadar University, Delhi NCR that you cherished the most?

My studio. It was very important to have my own studio, which I could access anytime. This provided me with the space to work without being disturbed, and also allowed me to set my own timetable.

#### Celebrating 10 years of the university, which is your favourite story during your time here, that instantly brings a smile to your face?

It's the simple things that I remember fondly, and frankly, there are too many such stories. Some of the best times were when my friends and I played ultimate frisbee on the lawns between 2A and 2B in the evenings. And also the late-night cycle rides through the campus. 
#### How we met


academics, research and expertise in global learning pedagogy.




